2023-24 Sixth Grade

Required reading (one book from list and one choice book):

Choose one or more of the following books: *Half a World Away* by Cynthia Kadohata *Counting by 7s* by Holly Goldberg Sloan *Out of my Mind* by Sharon M. Draper

The characters in these books face unique challenges. Think about the main character of the book you chose. How do you identify with this character, what are some similarities and differences between you and them? Do you agree with how the main character sees the problem? If you were in their shoes, would you look at the problem the same or differently? Be ready to share your connections and thinking.

In addition, choose a book to read that showcases your reading identity. What genre do you especially enjoy? Are you a fantasy reader? Do you enjoy mysteries? Nonfiction? Be ready to share your book choice and tell why it represents you as a reader.

We will engage in activities and discussions based on your summer reading during the first week of school. I am looking forward to learning more about each of you as a reader and thinker!

2023-24 Seventh Grade

Required Book: Chains by Laurie Halse Anderson

Enjoy reading about the courageous young protagonist, Isabel, as she navigates life as a slave girl during the dramatic times of 1776 in colonial America. Create a slide show that highlights the overall plot through five important events. For each slide, copy/paste or draw a picture that represents that important event. No words are necessary on the slides; just highlight your events with an interesting and relevant picture for each slide. We'll share and discuss the slide presentations on the first day of class.

In addition, choose one other book <u>outside</u> your normal reading preference. For example: If you really enjoy reading fantasy literature books from authors such as J.R.R. Tolkien and J.K. Rowling, then know that of yourself and choose another genre. A genre is a category of literary composition: westerns, crime thrillers, romance, military, health, etc. Be ready to introduce this second book and briefly explain a little bit about the basic literary elements of the story such as plot, characters, setting, and insights you might have realized.

Bring both books on the first day of school.

<u>Required</u>: choose one of the following ten books to read. Then create a slide presentation to share on the first day of class that shows the coming of age journey of the protagonist or protagonists.
